SCULPTURE PROFILE

RED SEA

Carmel has truly embraced the environment in Lorne with her sculpture for this year's Sculpture Trail. Made from Steel and Mixed Media, including recycled cray pot collars

and cable ties, her 'Red Sea' installation on the Erskine River refers to marine forms and to those specifically manufactured for the fishing industry. As a floating work it moves according to the wind and tides, and is extended by reflection in the water.



BARRY

BY BRUCE ARMSTRONG Bruce Armstrong is a widely recognised sculptor. One of his best known works is his giant 25metre high sculpture of Bunjil, the eagle, that stands overlooking the city of Melbourne near Southern Cross station. Made from timber and paint 'Barry', which will be exhibited as part of the Sculpture Trail this year, is somewhat smaller than Bunjil at only 1.95m, but is certainly distinctive. Bruce has described this work as



"a portrait of my cat as I imagine he might look staring out to sea". We look forward to welcoming 'Barry' to Lorne.

DISTRESS SIGNAL BY JOANNE MOTT

Joanne's Sculpturscape piece is very site specific. Composed of seaweed spelling out the word "Help" Joanne's work will conjure up multiple interpretations... has the seaweed washed up onto the beach with a call to us? Is it offering to help us, as seaweed is known to be composed of detoxifying constituents? Either way for a brief time during the tides cycle the message will be visible on the shore before it is washed back into the ocean from whence it came.
